*THE FIRST LESSON

Acts 2:42-47

⁴²[The baptized] devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers. ⁴³Awe came upon everyone, because many wonders and signs were being done by the apostles. ⁴⁴All who believed were together and had all things in common; ⁴⁵they would sell their possessions and goods and distribute the proceeds to all, as any had need. ⁴⁶Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, ⁴⁷praising God and having the goodwill of all the people. And day by day the Lord added to their number those who were being saved.

*THE SECOND LESSON

1 Peter 2:19-25

¹⁹It is a credit to you if, being aware of God, you endure pain while suffering unjustly. ²⁰If you endure when you are beaten for doing wrong, what credit is that? But if you endure when you do right and suffer for it, you have God's approval. ²¹For to this you have been called, because Christ also suffered for you, leaving you an example, so that you should follow in his steps. ²²"He committed no sin, and no deceit was found in his mouth." ²³When he was abused, he did not return abuse; when he suffered, he did not threaten; but he entrusted himself to the one who judges justly. ²⁴He himself bore our sins in his body on the cross, so that, free from sins, we might live for righteousness; by his

wounds you have been healed. ²⁵For you were going astray like sheep, but now you have returned to the shepherd and guardian of your souls.

*THE GOSPEL READING

John 10:1-10

[Jesus said:] 1"Very truly, I tell you, anyone who does not enter the sheepfold by the gate but climbs in by another way is a thief and a bandit. 2The one who enters by the gate is the shepherd of the sheep. 3The gatekeeper opens the gate for him, and the sheep hear his voice. He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. 4When he has brought out all his own, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow him because they know his voice. 5They will not follow a stranger, but they will run from him because they do not know the voice of strangers." 6Jesus used this figure of speech with them, but they did not understand what he was saying to them. 7So again Jesus said to them, "Very truly, I tell you, I am the gate for the sheep. 8All who came before me are thieves and bandits; but the sheep did not listen to them. 9I am the gate. Whoever enters by me will be saved, and will come in and go out and find pasture. 10The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly."

SERMON: PASTOR RICHARD CARBAUGH

A wealthy man had lost his son. Looking back on that difficult time, a time when he was as frightened and as lost as he had ever been, he remembered coming to the following conclusion. He said: "Here is something I cannot buy my way out of. Here is something I cannot work my way out of. Here is something I can only trust my way out of." When tragedy comes into our lives, the confusion and the hurt and the anger make it difficult to understand what has happened, difficult to now what to do or say, difficult to know how to go on. The one thing, perhaps the only thing that can be done in such a time, is to trust our way out of it.

Whether it is some personal challenge or loss, or whether it is enduring the uncertainty with the current situation in which we find ourselves, there are certain things we can do, certain actions we can take or refrain from taking that can help make things a little better, a little more bearable. But ultimately, no matter what we do, moving ahead is really a matter of trusting our way out of it.

Psalm 23 has been called a song of trust. It is a trust, not so much that certain things will happen in a certain way, as it is a trust in a presence in the midst of it all. It is a presence like that of a caring shepherd watching over the sheep. I can't hear this psalm without thinking of the story of the famous actor who was invited to a small country church. The church was filled with anticipation. The

actor recited a number of passages of scripture, the last of which was Psalm 23. It was a very moving experience for everyone. However, after he had finished, the oldest member of the congregation stood and also recited Psalm 23 - and his words were the most touching moment of the evening. The actor stood and said: "I was sitting here wondering why this man's words were more powerful, more moving than mine - and I concluded that it was because, while I knew the shepherd's psalm, this man knows the shepherd!"

The trust expressed in this Psalm is far from a naive, blind trust. All the pain and loss and adversity of life's journey are there. All the complexities of lives spent in conflict and fear are there. And yet, also there is the affirmation that God's presence can be trusted in the valley of the shadows. Anyone who has lived knows life is not all full tables and overflowing cups. Sometimes our hair isn't anointed with oil, but grimed with grease - or different because we can't get to the salon. Sometimes we are not lying in green pastures, but languishing on blue Mondays. Sometimes we are not resting beside still waters, but being swamped by storms and rising tides. Every person knows the valley of the shadow. Some are born into a valley of poverty, abuse and illness. Some are born in green pastures, but dig their own dark valley through addictions, greed or violence. Sometimes we find ourselves in the valley by powers and circumstances beyond our control. None of us gets out of this life without walking in the valley - there are no short cuts around it and often it seems like the walk will last forever. But hear again what the psalm says: "Though I walk THROUGH the valley." God does not intend for us to stay in the valley. We CAN walk THROUGH our problems. We CAN walk THROUGH our sorrows. We CAN walk THROUGH our mistakes - if we can trust the One who is walking with us.

And yet, that trusting is often the hardest thing for us to do. When something happens in our lives, trust is often one of the first casualties - whether it is trust in others, trust in the future, trust in being safe again, even trust in the promise and presence of God. But the truth is that trust may be our only hope. Trusting our way out of it may be the only thing we have.

There was a little girl who was clinging to a boat that had capsized. She held on as long as she could, but her small arms grew weary. As she cried out that she just couldn't hold on any longer, her father grabbed hold of her arm and said: "Don't worry, I'll hold onto you!" In our Baptism, God grabbed hold of us and said: "Don't worry, I'll hold onto you and I will never let go. Nothing will break my grip on you." The question is sometimes asked: "How do we live in this world without letting the world claim us, without letting the world determine who and how we are?" The reality is that it is hard to do. But our hope lies in remembering that we have been claimed by the One who is IN, but not OF the world. Our hope lies in knowing the Shepherd.

You may know that in some places when sheep of different flocks gather around a watering hole, and it is time to leave, a shepherd will call out to his sheep and only the sheep that belong to that shepherd will respond. They won't respond to other voices, but only to the voice of their shepherd. They respond because they have come to trust that voice. They respond because they know that shepherd.

Philip Yancy tells of a friend who was swimming in a large lake at dusk. He had got out some distance from shore and, without warning, an unusual evening fog surrounded him and he could no longer see the shore. He splashed around trying to find the right direction, but soon decided to stop and conserve his energy. As he did, he was able to hear a familiar voice calling from shore. He moved toward the sound of that voice and eventually reached the shore safely.

Jesus said: "I am the Good Shepherd. My sheep hear my voice, and I know them and they follow me. And they will never perish." There is a power for life that our Resurrected Lord has set loose in this world. It is the power that walks with us through the valley of shadows. It is the power that prepares a table before us. It is the power that fills our cup to overflowing. It is the power that anoints our head with the oil of gladness. As we walk through the valley, may we be able to hear the voice of our Shepherd calling us, and find ourselves trusting that voice as it says: "There is nothing, absolutely nothing, that can snatch you out of my hand." Though I walk through the valley of the shadow, I will fear no evil, for You are with me, and I will trust You always. Amen.
