### **PASTORAL STATEMENT FOLLOWING THE ATTACK ON THE CAPITOL**

*On the Day of Epiphany, the day that the light of a star guided the magi, the wise men, to their final destination, the newborn Messiah; we saw some dark things happen in our country. We told our kids: "January 6, 2021, is a date you'll be learning about in history class." A day where protesters turned into rioters and worse. A day where lives were lost. A day where the Capitol was breached and vandalized by its own citizens, where the process of democracy was interrupted. A day where our standing around the world was diminished. A day of shame. On Wednesday our country was seized by fear and unease as a result of this violence, this hate, and this ignorance.*

*I know that in our country we have this principle about separation of church and state. That means that we don't get to impose our religion on others, or on the government, and that the government doesn't get to impose any religion on anybody else. So why am I talking about this? Well, I'm not here to impose. I'm talking about this because our Christian faith does inform our personal choices, including our politics, and how we live our lives. Martin Luther taught us about our Christian vocations, the various roles and ways through which we live out our faith. They include our family relationships, our jobs, our activities, and also the vocation of being citizens in this democracy. So, I'm speaking right now not just to once again condemn violence, but to speak just a little bit about our civic vocations.*

*In John's Gospel Jesus gives a multiple-chapters-long monologue often called "the farewell discourse." Before the events of the Passion, Jesus was preparing his disciples for his impending death and resurrection and ascension. Jesus gives them instruction and promises the Holy Spirit. Jesus prays for them. In John 17:11-15 Jesus says this: "And now I am no longer in the world, but they are in the world, and I am coming to you. Holy Father, protect them in your name that you have given me, so that they may be one, as we are one... But now I am coming to you, and I speak these things in the world so that they may have my joy made complete in themselves. I have given them your word, and the world has hated them because they do not belong to the world, just as I do not belong to the world. I am not asking you to take them out of the world, but I ask you to protect them from the evil one."*

As followers of Christ we are both in the world and out of the world, and we pray in the Lord's Prayer that God's kingdom would come in and through us. And Christ prays that the Father would protect us while we carry on with Christ's commandment to love others the way he loves us, to protect us from the world and the evil one, who has definitely been busy. And part of the way we follow Christ's commandment and example, part of the way we love and serve the world Christ died to save, is to be honest.

One of Martin Luther's central, hallmark teachings was about the Theology of the Cross. Here's a helpful explanation: "The cross of Jesus Christ is the most important and powerful thing in Christian faith. But it's easy to misunderstand what this means. A 'theologian of glory,' based on nothing more than individual wishes, tries to use the cross as a starting point for personal gain – to make people healthy and wealthy, successful and popular. A 'theologian of the cross,' in contrast, thinks of the cross as the last stop for sin, death, and delusions of grandeur. In other words, the cross is an end point."

Luther wrote, "A theologian of glory calls evil good and good evil. A theologian of the cross calls a thing what it actually is." The cross was an evil instrument of execution and torture and humiliation, and through it God brought about life and salvation. We can't gloss over the first part. We need to call a thing what it is.

Is any part of government perfect? By no means. But in this country we have the right to speak, and to protest, and to assemble, so that we can work for change and justice and a more perfect union. These actions are guaranteed and protected by the Constitution, and are patriotic exercises of citizenship. Violence like we saw on Epiphany is not patriotic. We need to call the thing what it is.

It is also not patriotic to ignore facts, or to close your eyes to evident, provable truths. That could apply to an election that has been certified and counted and challenged and affirmed, on multiple levels, multiple times. This election wasn't stolen. To ignore plain facts and continue to proceed as though some great wrong was done is irresponsible, and, clearly, dangerous. Call a thing what it is, and let's not support, in any way, the perpetuation of violence and ignorance. If you see others doing so, online or in person, call a thing what it is. Speak the truth in love.

This can also apply to the science of epidemiology and the fact that masks and social distancing stop the spread of a virus. The pandemic is not a hoax. To those who say so, grow up. Love your country and protect your neighbors and yourselves. Call a thing what it is. Speak the truth in love.

*This could apply to the cries and the movement for racial justice in this country. Think of this contrast: On the one hand, we have tanks that rolled down the street at a predominantly peaceful Black Lives Matter protest in D.C. last summer, with Christians getting tear-gassed for handing out water and medical aid. On the other hand, we have this past Wednesday, where a protest became a riot and a desecration of the democratic process, and the perpetrators traipsing around Congress with confederate and white supremacist flags – and Christian flags – and daring the police to stop them. For the most part, they were walked out of the building and off the premises peacefully. How can anyone not see the double standard? This wasn't quietly kneeling before a sports game, or peacefully protesting the killing of unarmed black people. This was intimidation and terrorism, because their candidate lost an election. Because the challenges didn't hold up.*

*This was threatening the lives of people. This was trying to disrupt democracy. This was ignoring truth. This wasn't patriotic. And it wasn't Christian, either. Call a thing what it is. Speak the truth in love. May God protect us from the evil one, and all the lies and distortions of truth that people use to justify their violence and ignorance.*

*Back to John, this time chapter 17, verses 20-21: "I ask not only on behalf of these, but also on behalf of those who will believe in me through their word, that they may all be one. As you, Father, are in me and I am in you, may they also be in us, so that the world may believe that you have sent me." The Christian flags flying during the riot and the breach of the Capitol are not helping the world believe in our God of love. The great number of Christians saying and doing nothing about everything that happened and everything that led to it happening are not helping the world believe in our God of love.*

*I implore and exhort you all, again, to be theologians of the cross. Please, with God's help, call things what they are, even with those closest to you, and when necessary with yourselves, which of course makes such conversations the most difficult. Speak the truth in love. Work towards unity – not uniformity. Work towards peace and justice through all of your God-given vocations, including that of citizen. Be public witnesses to Jesus' self-sacrificing way of the cross, and condemn these acts of violence and all of the willful ignorance of far too many people that enabled and encouraged it, for far, far too long. To those who actually say they approve of the actions that took place in the Capitol, you must overcome hatred with love, and ignorance with truth, with your words and actions alike. You must not remain silent, or wait for it to blow over, or settle down. If we all aren't working to spread the good news of our God of love, this will only get worse.*

A new hymnal just came out in November, called *All Creation Sings*. And because of the world we have stewarded in recent years, it includes such pages as "A Prayer of Lament," "Lamenting Racism," and "Service after a Violent Event." I'd like to share some prayers from this last one, a *Service after a Violent Event*:

Let us pray...

Gracious God, the news of these last days has ripped our hearts and torn our souls. We are walking through the valley of the shadow of death. In the depths of pain and anger, we gather before you, O God, our rock and our refuge. You are our only comfort. You are our only hope. Merciful God, you know the depth of our suffering. We have only begun to mourn all that we have lost.

We wait for you, Lord, and in your word we hope. Our help comes from you, O Lord, you who made heaven and earth. In the face of our grief, you are our solace. In the face of uncertainty, you are our rock. In the wake of tragedy, you are our hope. So even as we weep, we praise you, and place our trust in you. We pray in the name of the one who suffered and died and was raised for us, our Savior, Jesus Christ. Amen.

And I give you this charge:

Go out into the world in peace; have courage; hold on to what is good; return no one evil for evil; strengthen the fainthearted; support the weak, and help the suffering; honor all people; love and serve the Lord, rejoicing in the power of the Holy Spirit. Thanks be to God.





## **FIRST LESSON: Genesis 1:1-5**

**Lector**

A reading from Genesis.

Out of chaos, God brings order. Out of the formless void, God brings light. This familiar story was good news for the Israelites, who experienced much chaos in their history. It remains good news for us. God created and continues to create new life.

1In the beginning when God created the heavens and the earth, 2the earth was a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep, while a wind from God swept over the face of the waters. 3Then God said, "Let there be light"; and there was light. 4And God saw that the light was good; and God separated the light from the darkness. 5God called the light Day, and the darkness he called Night. And there was evening and there was morning, the first day.

## **SECOND LESSON: Acts 19:1-7**

**Lector**

A reading from Acts.

In Ephesus, Paul encounters people who had received John's baptism of repentance but had never heard of the Holy Spirit or of baptism in the name of Jesus. After Paul baptizes them, the Holy Spirit comes upon them and empowers them with gifts of the Spirit.

1While Apollos was in Corinth, Paul passed through the interior regions and came to Ephesus, where he found some disciples. 2He said to them, "Did you receive the Holy Spirit when you became believers?" They replied, "No, we have not even heard that there is a Holy Spirit." 3Then he said, "Into what then were you baptized?" They answered, "Into John's baptism." 4Paul said, "John baptized with the baptism of repentance, telling the people to believe in the one who was to come after him, that is, in Jesus." 5On hearing this, they were baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus. 6When Paul had laid his hands on them, the Holy Spirit came upon them, and they spoke in tongues and prophesied— 7altogether there were about twelve of them.

## **GOSPEL: Mark 1:4-11**

P: The Holy Gospel according to Mark.

**C: *Glory to you, O Lord.***

Mark's gospel reports the story of Jesus' baptism with some irony: the one on whom the Spirit descends is himself the one who will baptize others with the Holy Spirit.

4John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. 5And people from the whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him, and were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins. 6Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. 7He proclaimed, "The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the thong of his sandals. 8I have baptized you with water; but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit."

9In those days Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. 10And just as he was coming up out of the water, he saw the heavens torn apart and the Spirit descending like a dove on him. 11And a voice came from heaven, "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased."

## **SERMON**

**Pastor Ryan Radtke**

*I've already said a bit today, so I'll keep this message short. Which, as it turns out, shouldn't be too tough – because the story of Jesus' baptism helps us understand some core things about God, and about our own baptisms. But let's start at the beginning. Like, all the way at the beginning.*

*Today we heard the first five verses of the first book of the Bible, Genesis. We heard about how God started the Creative process. In the beginning, the earth was a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep, while a wind from God swept over the face of the waters. Now, that wind, or in Hebrew ruach, or in Greek pneuma, is the very same word that gets translated as spirit, or breath. That's right, folks – the Holy Spirit was right there at the beginning, stirring things up. Not too much later, God separates the lights of the sky, into Day and Night. God brings order to Creation, to the world. And God saw that it was good.*

*Fast forward to Jesus' baptism. God was starting something new with this Savior. We're back in the water, and the Spirit's action this time is to descend, like a dove, onto Jesus. Jesus had come, as John the Baptist told everyone, to baptize with the Holy Spirit, to complete what John started with the baptism of repentance. In other words, once the heavens were separated, torn apart, Jesus began the real work of bringing order to sin, through forgiveness. And God saw that it was good, saying, "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased."*

Fast forward once more, to our baptisms. God creates something new in us, with us, and for us, through baptism. Our life in Christ starts in the water, too, and the Spirit comes down to mark us with the cross of Christ and seal us with the same Spirit forever. I can't guarantee that the heavens are torn apart, or that the sky is separated at each of our baptisms; but I can share the words we say immediately after a baptism: "Let your light so shine before others that they may see your good works and glorify your Father in heaven." Separate the darkness of the sin of our souls and of the world by the light of Christ that shines in us and out from us, bringing the Kingdom of God to order in this world. We are each named and claimed as a beloved child of God, and we declare it good with our amens.

God comes down from heaven; the Spirit stirs and descends and seals; God brings order, through creation and repentance and forgiveness; light shines through the darkness and overcomes the sin. God works through this order so that all might see the goodness of God through our words and deeds and glorify God. And God calls all of this good.

I thought about getting into different competing understandings and theologies of baptism, and how the reading from Acts gets into the discussion on which types of baptisms "count" according to different Christian denominations. How much water, infant baptism versus believer's baptism, does it count if there isn't some sort of sign like speaking in tongues. But today, let's just keep it simple: God is the one who baptizes; God is the one who comes down. God through the Spirit stirs things up. God brings order and washes away sin. God is the one who gifts us and calls us good. God is the one who is consistent from the first day to our baptism day and beyond. God is the one who makes us a new creation by joining us, in the waters of baptism, to the death and resurrection of Jesus the Christ.

God is the one who commands us to let our lights shine, and God is also the one who gives us the abilities, the opportunities, the gifts, and the vocations to do so. Each day we remember our baptisms, and we die to sin and are raised to new life in Christ. Each day is a creation day. Each day we are new creations. We don't live each day like it's our last; we live each day like it's our first, full of promise and hope, coming up out of the water.

How do we navigate the challenges of life? How do we not get bogged down in the old cycles of sin, the variations on an unending theme of crisis and hardship and bad news, especially in the world we're living in right now? By remembering God's constancy and goodness, from the first day to our baptism day and beyond. Heavens opened, order created, Spirit moving, freed from sin, called good. Lights to shine. Living each day as the new creations we are; living each day like it's our first, to overcome the disheartening and the terrifying things in this world. Able to go out into this world as truth-tellers, calling things what they are, speaking the truth in love, and glorifying God.

Promises are made at a baptism; affirmed at a confirmation; recommitted to each new day: to live among God's faithful people; to hear the word of God and share in the Lord's supper; to proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed; to serve all people, following the example of Jesus; and to strive for justice and peace in all the earth.

People of God, do you promise to support and pray for one another in your life in Christ, in your life of living out these promises? If so, please say, "We do and we ask God to help and guide us."

Let us pray: We give you thanks, O God, that through water and the Holy Spirit you give your daughters and sons new birth, cleanse them from sin, and raise them to eternal life. Sustain each of your children with the gift of the Holy Spirit: the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of counsel and might, the spirit of knowledge and the fear of the Lord, the spirit of joy in your presence, both now and forever. Amen.

Brothers and sisters; new creations: let your light so shine before others that they may see your good works and glorify your Father in heaven. May God – and all peoples – see that the lights are good. Amen.





## **UPDATED: REBUILD RVA GRANT PROGRAM**

On October 28, the Governor's Office released information about an expansion of the Rebuild Virginia Grants. The grants are available to small businesses and non-profits. Unlike the last time round of Rebuild Virginia grants, the expansion specifically says that an organization can receive funding even if the organization received CARES Act Funding. Qualified recipients can receive a grant of up to three months' worth of expenses to help with salaries, mortgage, utilities, etc. The FAQs aren't as entirely clear, but when you combine the FAQs with the application guide (pg 4 in particular addresses what is excluded for those with CARES Act funding), it appears that most organizations in Virginia are eligible. This funding may prove particularly helpful for child care and preschool ministries that had issues with part-time employees and PPP Loan calculations. One potential hurdle for an application is the requirement for a DUNS number. The DUNS numbers appear to be standard practice in the for-profit world and almost unheard of in the non-profit world. It is possible for a church or non-profit to apply for a DUNS number, but the online process to get the number can be confusing.

## **VIRGINIA RENT AND MORTGAGE RELIEF PROGRAM (RMRP)**

The Virginia Rent and Mortgage Relief Program (RMRP) is designed to support and ensure housing stability across the commonwealth during the coronavirus pandemic. Depending on availability of funds and household need, the RMRP may provide financial assistance for rent or mortgage payments for eligible households. This includes financial assistance for rent or mortgage payments past due beginning April 1, 2020 and onward. Financial assistance is a one-time payment with opportunity for renewal based on availability of funding and the household's need for additional assistance and continued eligibility.
